National population projections



National population projections - Office for National Statistics

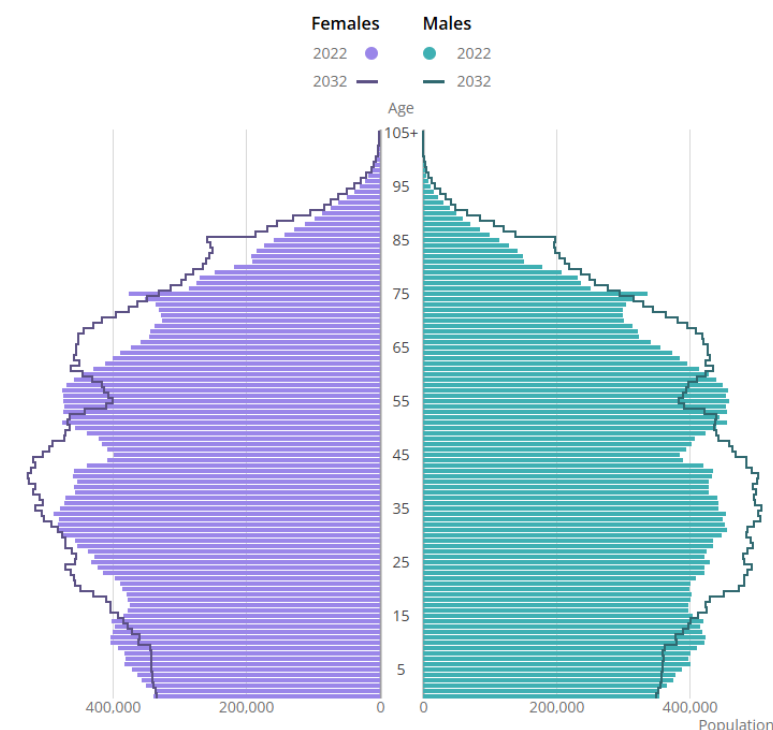
(published in 2025)

These projections are at national level (not available for Hertsmere), but the highlights are:

Over the 10 years between mid-2022 and mid-2032,

- **the population of the UK is projected to increase** by 4.9 million (**7.3% increase**) from an estimated 67.6 million to 72.5 million; this increase is projected to arise from net migration of 4.9 million compared with 6.8 million births and 6.8 million deaths.
- it is projected that there will be **a similar number of deaths and births in the UK**
- **the number of people at state pension age** is projected to increase by 1.7 million from an estimated 12.0 million to 13.7 million people (**13.8% increase**); this takes into account the planned increases in State Pension age to 67 for both sexes.
- These projections **assume higher long-term international migration than in the previous (2021-based) national population projections**; the projections also assume lower future fertility and life expectancy improvement.

How do Hertsmere Wards rank compared to other Wards?

The values calculated for each domain are population-weighted average ranks of the LSOAs in each ward. Here, you can see where Hertsmere Wards stand in the national context of the 6,793 wards in England (as at 2025) and local context of the 176 wards in Hertfordshire.

Both the England and Hertfordshire sets of ranks have also been divided into 10 equal groups or Deciles.

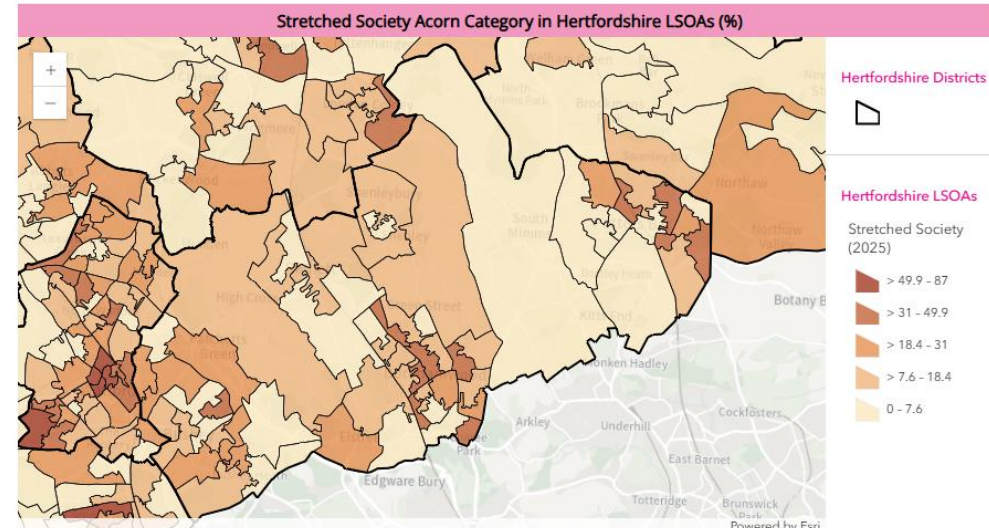
Households likely to be struggling financially and where they are likely to live

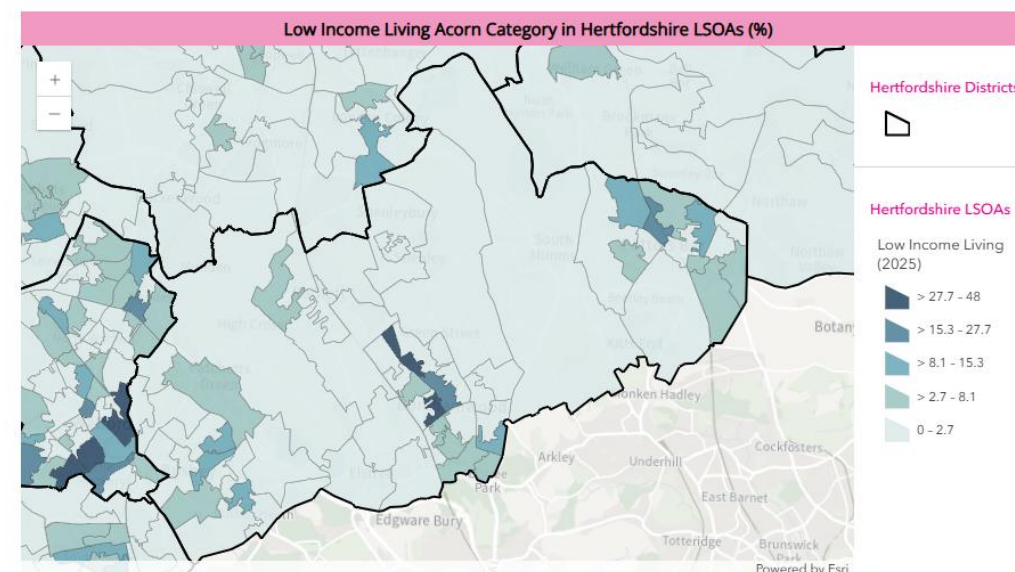
Who are most likely to need assistance from public services?

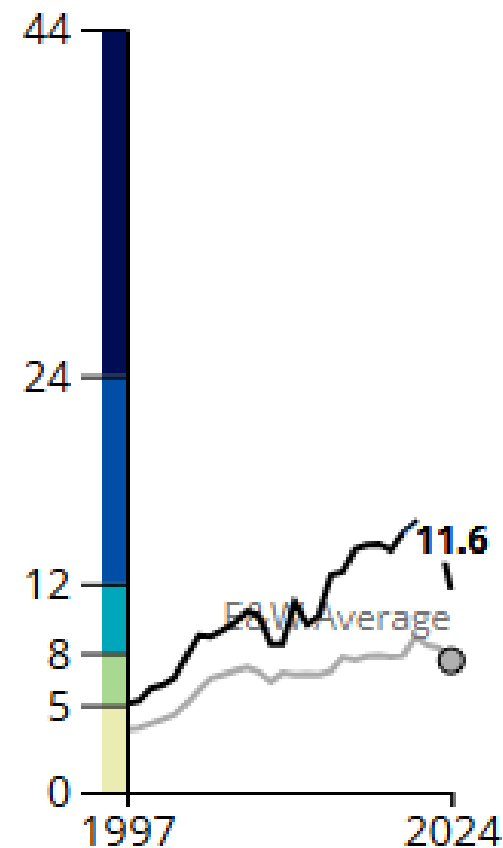
Housing affordability in England and Wales: 2024 (published March 2025, ONS)

Median affordability ratio

Key observations for Hertsmere:

- In 2024, the median average home in Hertsmere, at £516,000, cost 11.6 times the median average earnings of a full-time employee at £44,347.
- (For comparison, in England a median average home, at £290,000, cost 7.7 times the median average earnings of a full-time employee at £37,600).
- Affordability in Hertsmere reached a high of 15.5 in 2021. Affordability has improved since 2021 (the value of the ratio has fallen in this period from 15.5 in 2021 to 11.6 in 2024). Median house sales prices have decreased by 1% since 2023, while average earnings have increased by 16%.

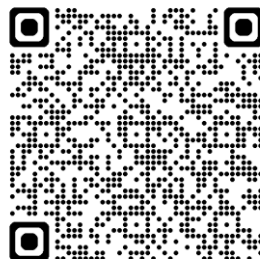

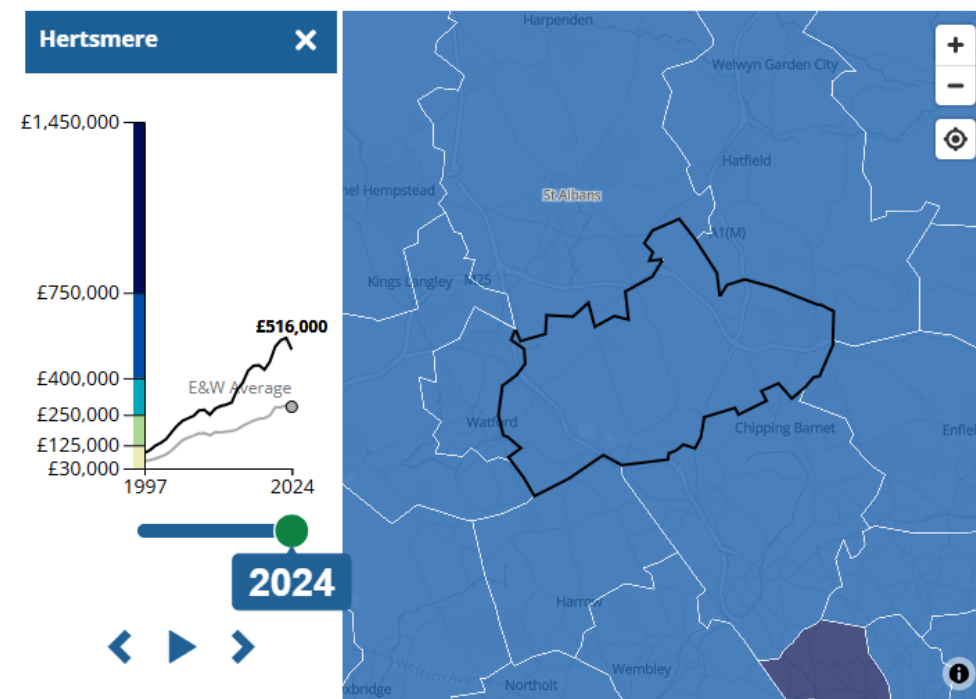
Median housed prices

- **2023 was Hertsmere's highest median house price of £564,375. This decreased in 2024 to £516,000.** (This decrease in median house price was the first since 2018-2019).

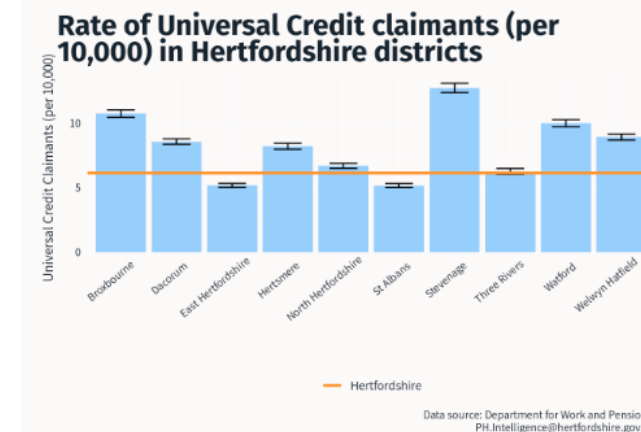

Universal credit

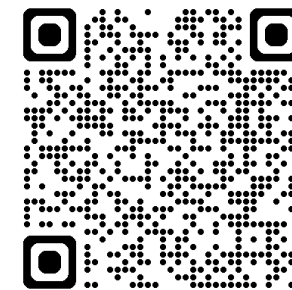
Universal Credit is a benefit payment designed to help with living costs. It is paid monthly and is available to those on a low income, out of work, or unable to work. Individuals are eligible for universal credit if they are 18 or over, under state pension age, low income or out of work, and have less than £16,000 in savings and investments. The universal credit data shows claimants in Hertfordshire in 2023.

By district **By number of children** **By FSM threshold**

Overall in Hertfordshire, the rate of universal credit claimants per 10,000 population is 6.13. Of all Hertfordshire districts, the districts with the highest rate of universal credit claimants was in Stevenage (12.7 per 10,000) followed by Broxbourne (10.8 per 10,000), which were both significantly higher than the Hertfordshire rate.

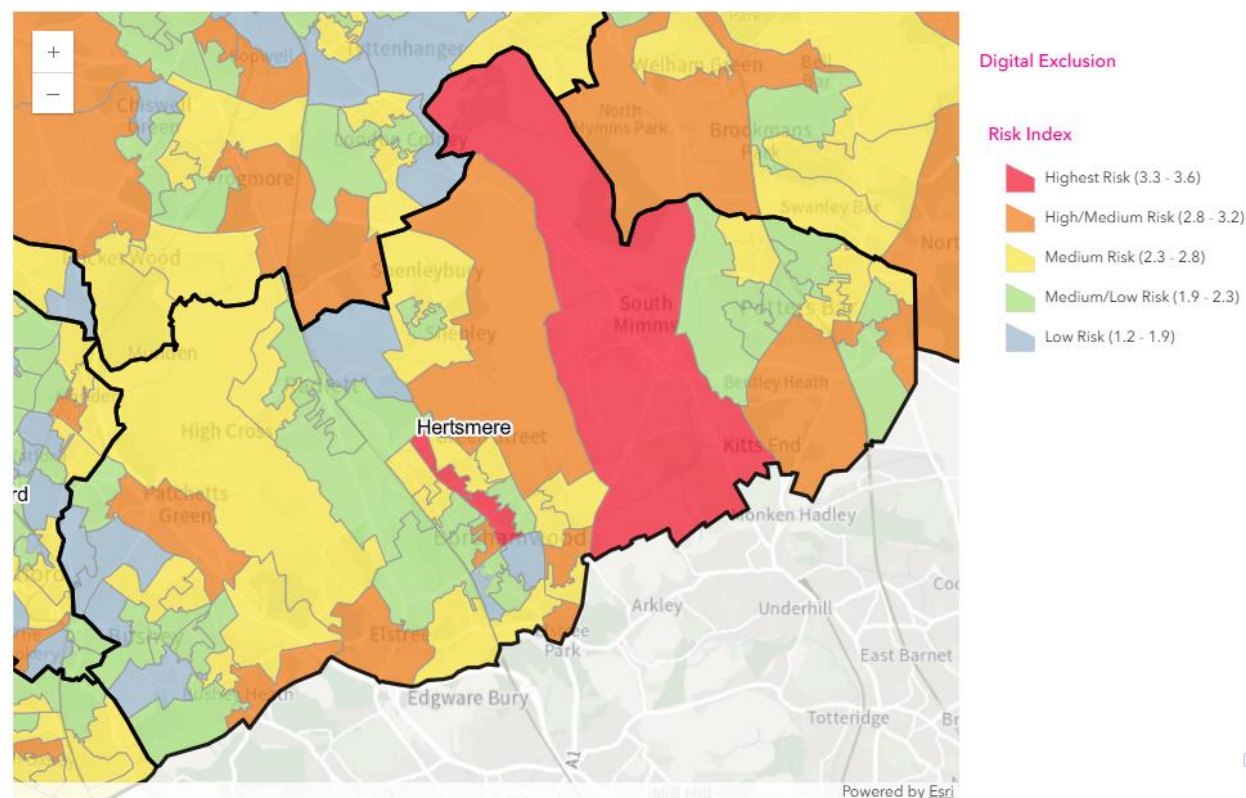
The LSOAs in the two highest risk areas are in these wards:

- **Highest risk (red):** Borehamwood Cowley Hill, Shenley
- **High/medium high risk (orange):** Shenley, Potters Bar Oakmere, Bentley Heath and The Royds, Borehamwood Kenilworth, Borehamwood Hillside, Bushey St James, Bushey Heath, Elstree

All of the data included in this report is sourced from existing published collections and available at local authority level. As additional data becomes available it will be added to the report to ensure it is useful and useable for councils. Some of the data used in this report may not be available for all authorities.

How can the Index be used?

The Index can be used to understand the risk of exclusion from using digital devices at LSOA level. **It cannot be used to understand exclusion in smaller areas such as postcode level.** Only around a quarter of the index is based on broadband speeds, the majority of the index takes into account the characteristics and demography of the population within the area

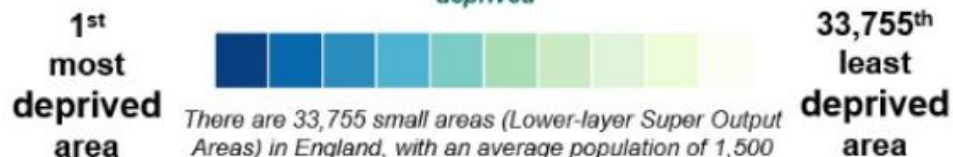

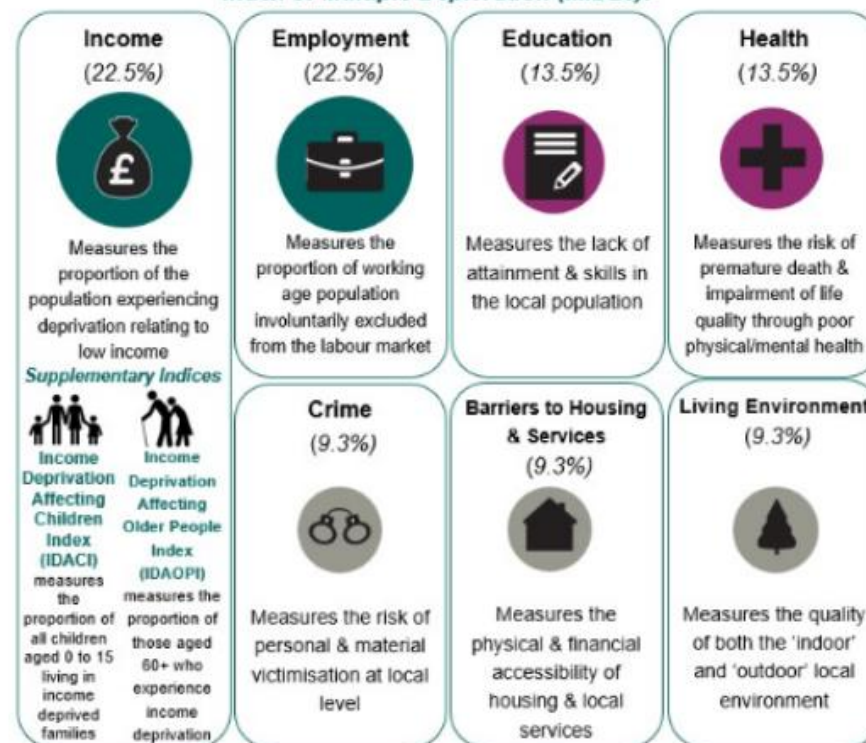

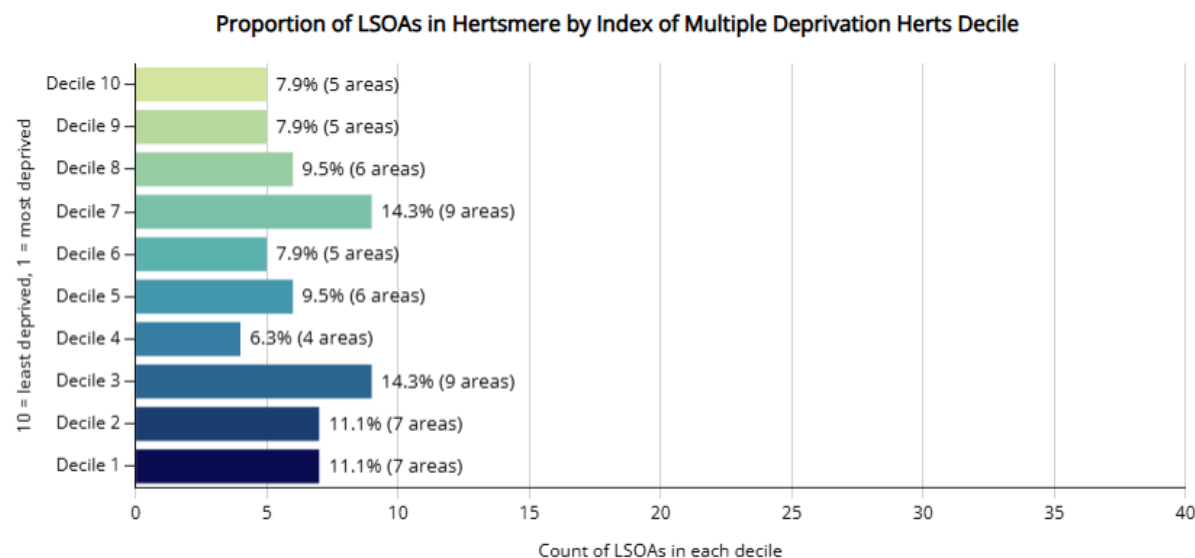

IMD Relative to Hertfordshire

Use this measure when you need to focus on a Hertfordshire-specific strategy such as community outreach or local service planning. e.g. "This LSOAs in the **20% most deprived (Decile 1 and 2) areas in Hertfordshire**". It will therefore help with local prioritisation of resource allocation where all areas are within Hertfordshire.

There are a total of 713 LSOAs in Hertfordshire of which 63 are in Hertsmere.

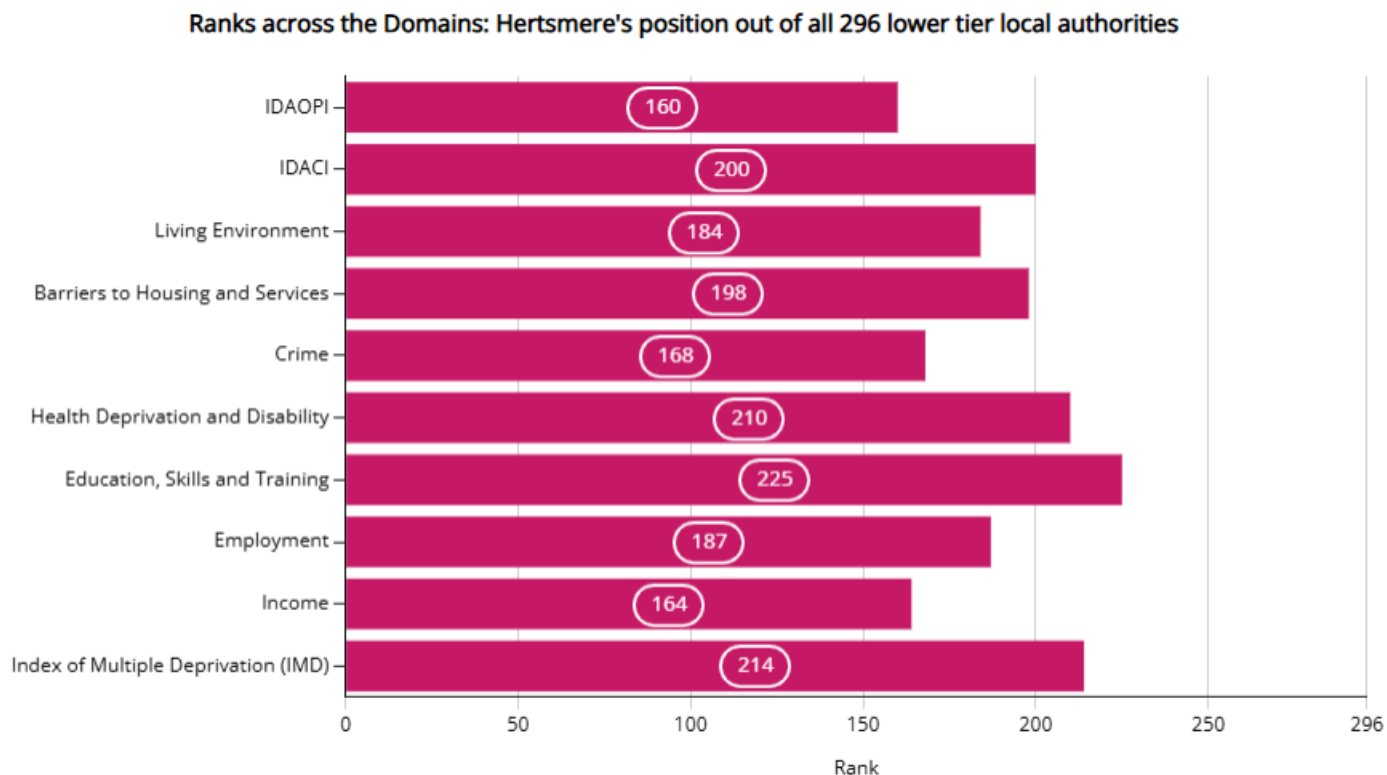

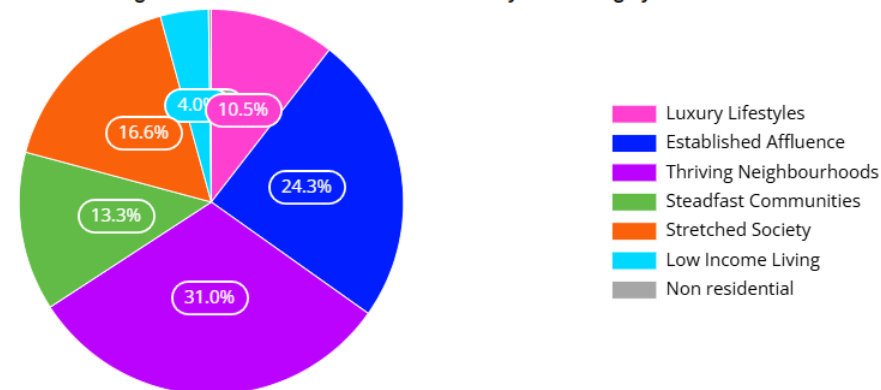

The following table describes the household categories as defined by Acorn:

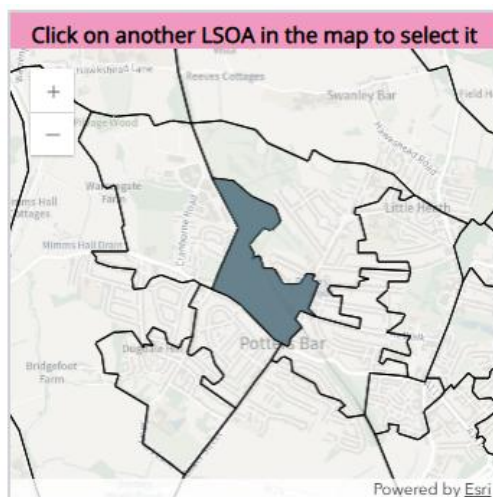
Luxury Lifestyles	The most affluent people in the county , with high levels of savings and investments , living in the most expensive properties . Often middle-aged or older people , living in rural areas. Some neighbourhoods contain very well-off families with school-aged children , particularly more suburban locations.
Established Affluence	Wealthy and successful people living in large houses which they own in affluent, high status areas of the county. Often middle-aged or older people , but also including some well-off families with school-aged children
Thriving Neighbourhoods	Financially comfortable households who have a good standard of living , on an income above the average.
Steadfast Communities	This category contains much of middle of the road Britain with working families on incomes just below the average . Living in a mix of tenures.
Stretched Society	Traditional working class areas of the county containing younger families, flat sharers and students privately renting their homes. Living in a mix of tenures.
Low Income Living	This category contains the most deprived areas of towns and cities, with the lowest incomes . It contains a higher proportion of single people across the age groups, often socially renting their flats.
Not Private Households	These are areas where the bulk of the residents are not living in private households. This covers communal establishments and businesses .

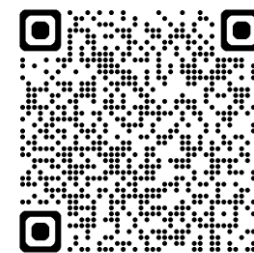

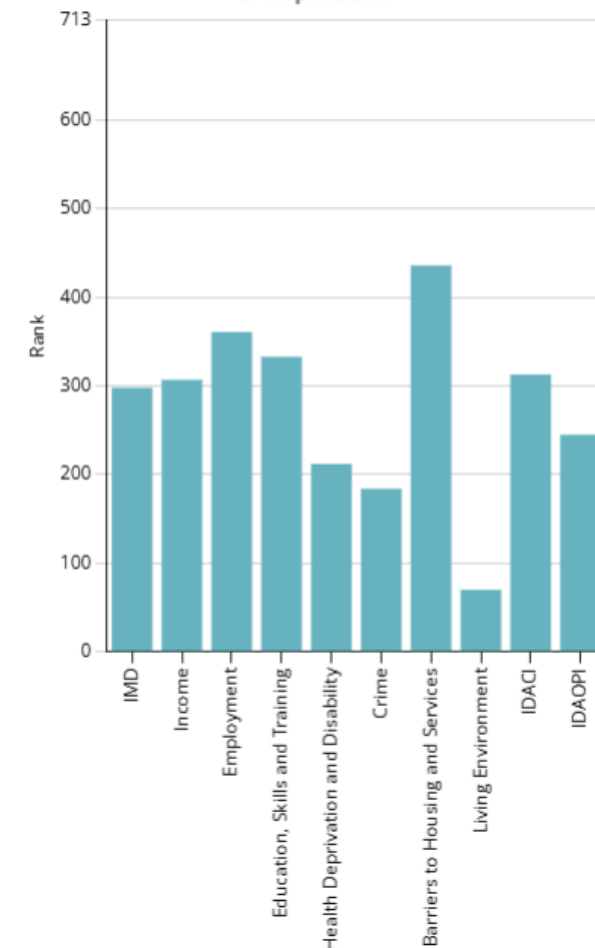

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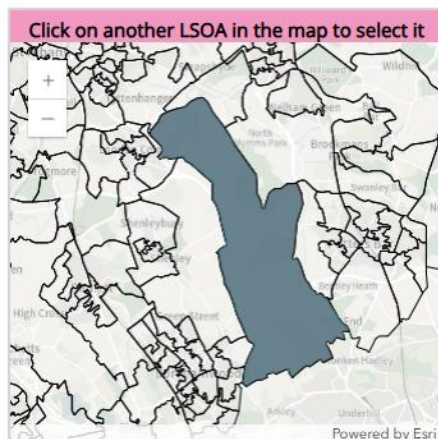
How LSOA Hertsmere 001D ranks in Hertfordshire across the different deprivation domains in the Indices of Deprivation

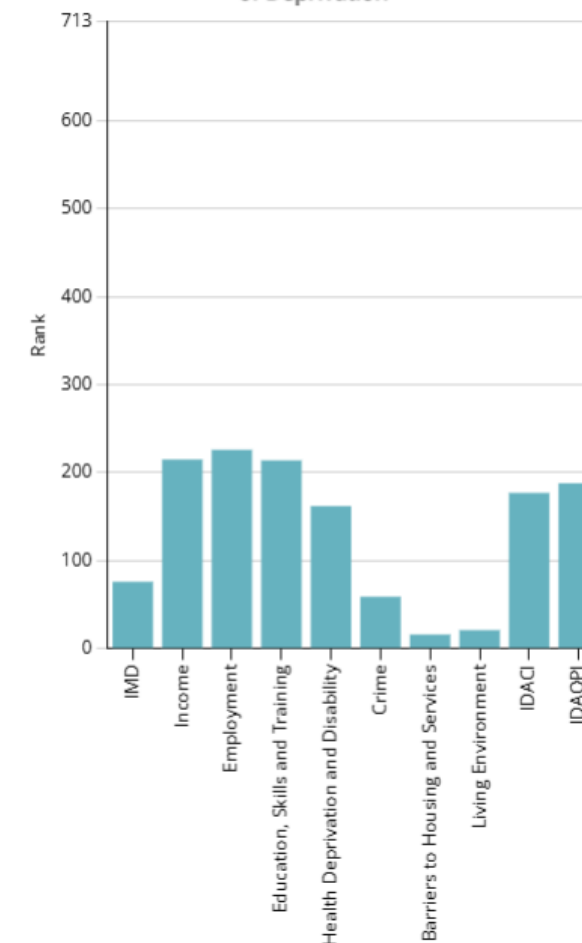

How LSOA Hertsmeire 004D ranks in Hertfordshire across the different deprivation domains in the Indices of Deprivation

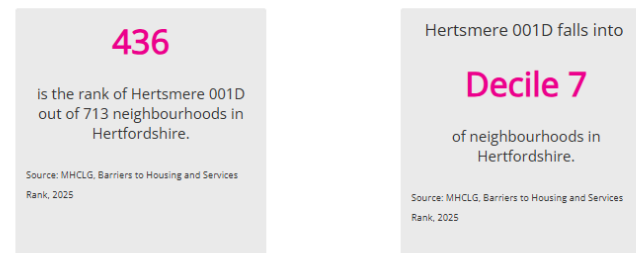

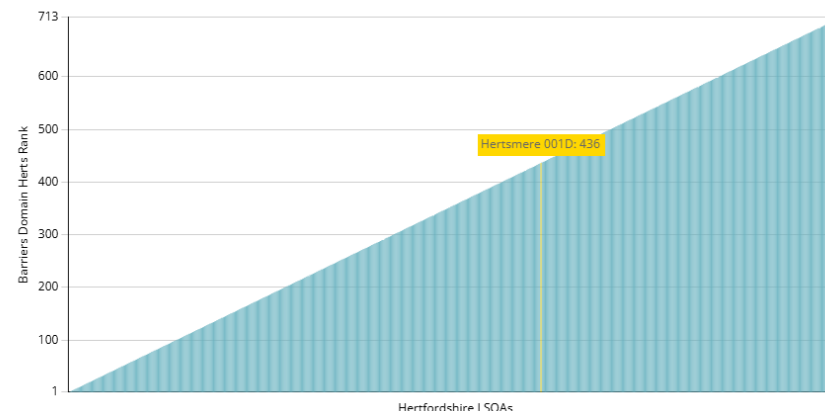

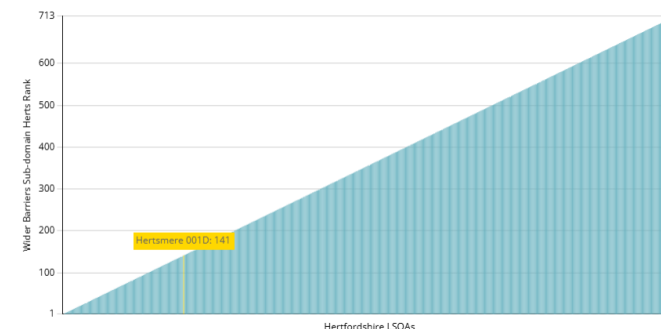
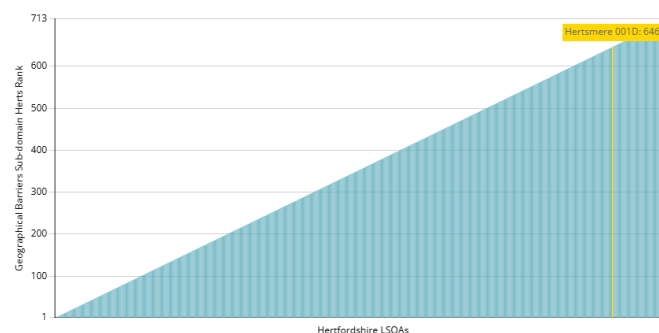

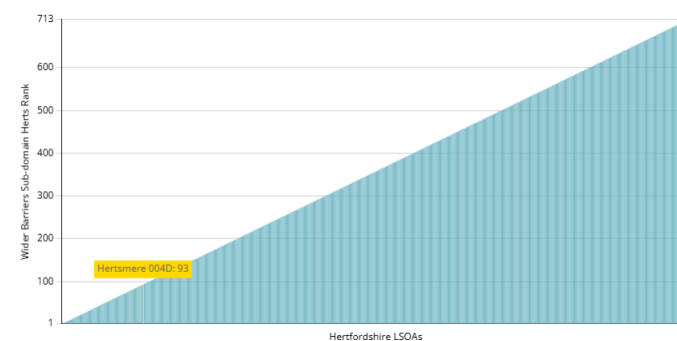

How Hertsmere 004D compares locally with its neighbours in the Barriers Domain Herts Rank



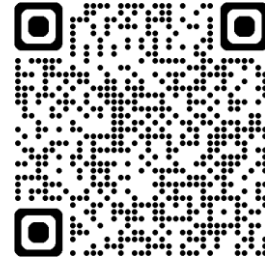

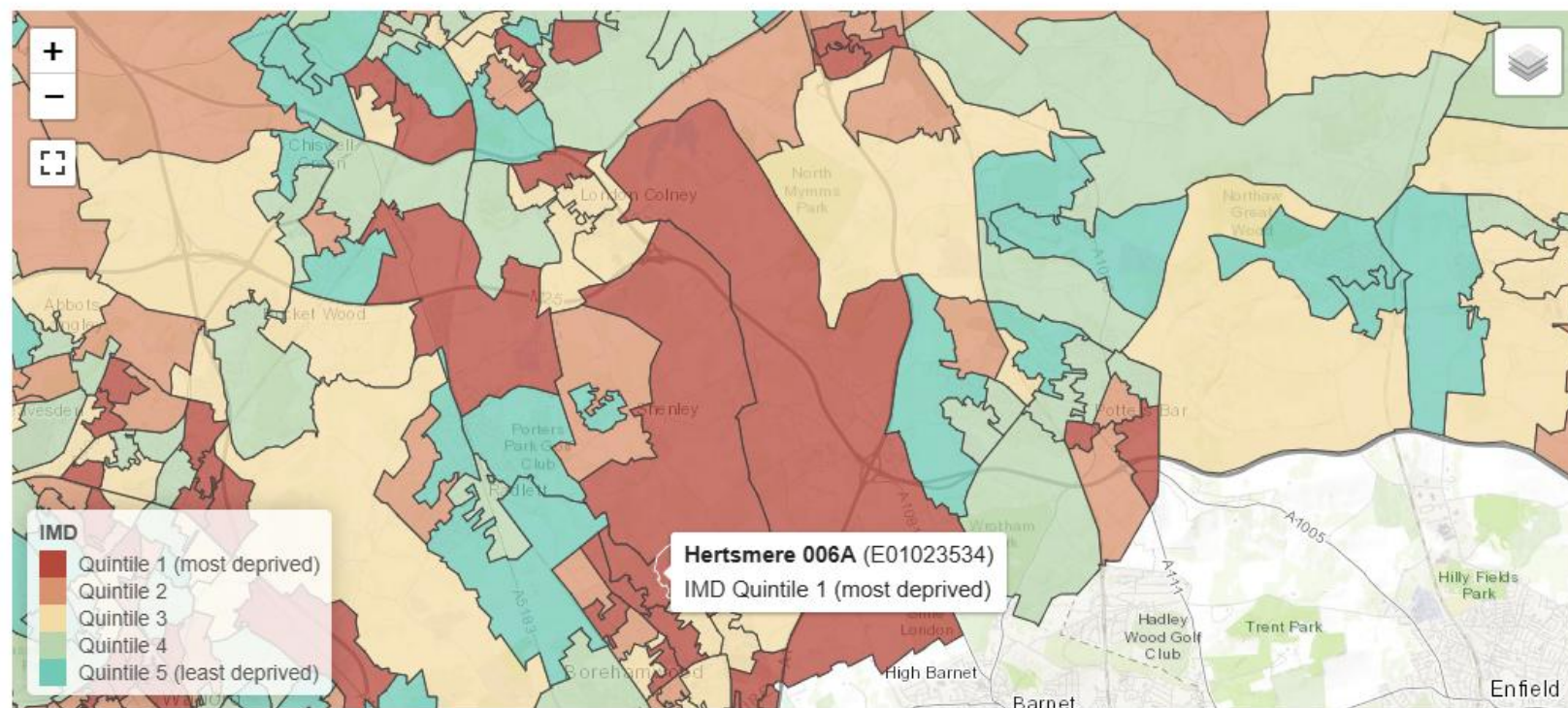

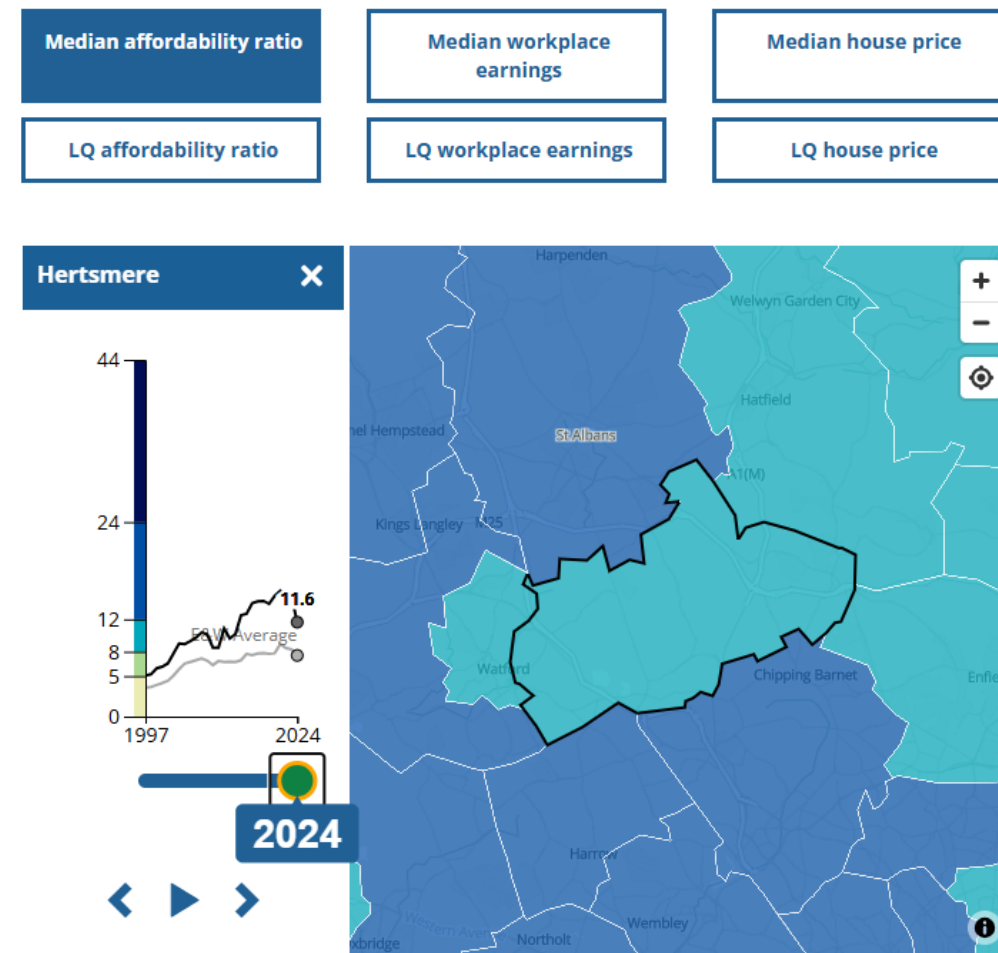

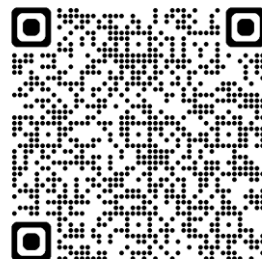

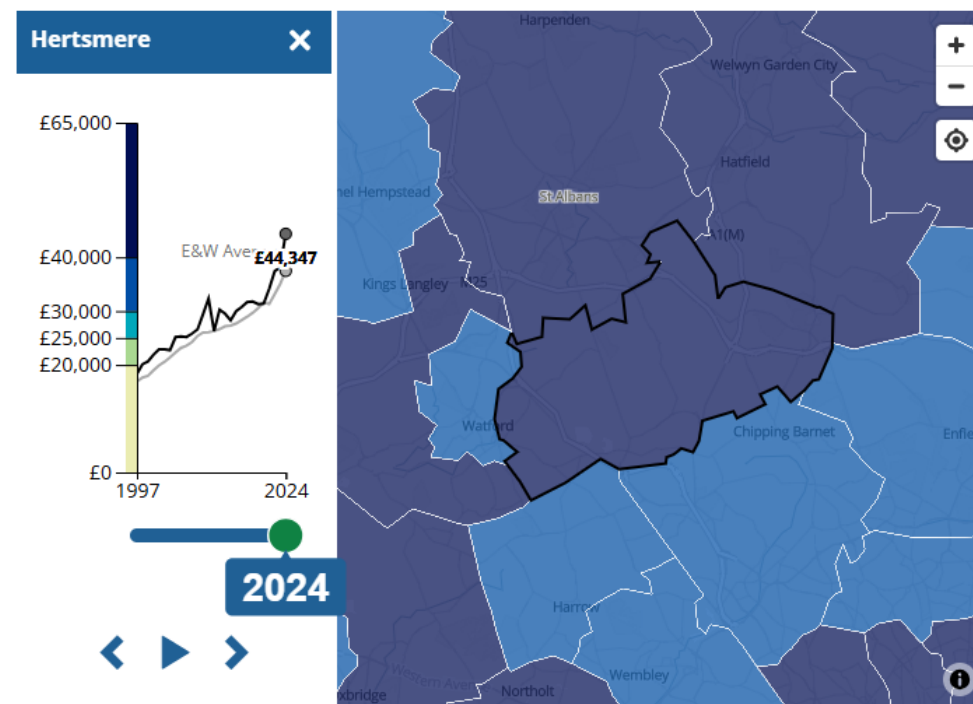

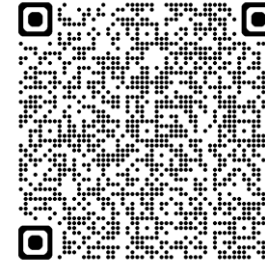

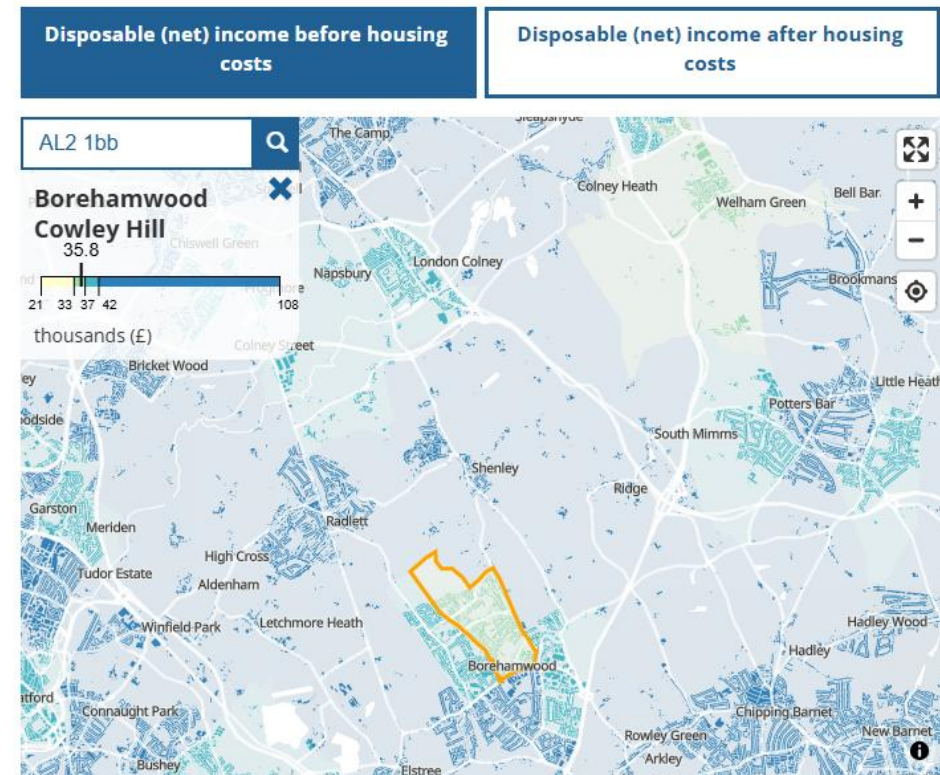

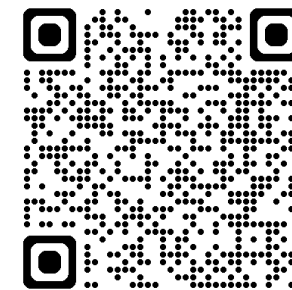
Figure 1: Enter a postcode to see the average household income for the local area (based on areas of between 2,000 and 6,000 households called MSOAs)

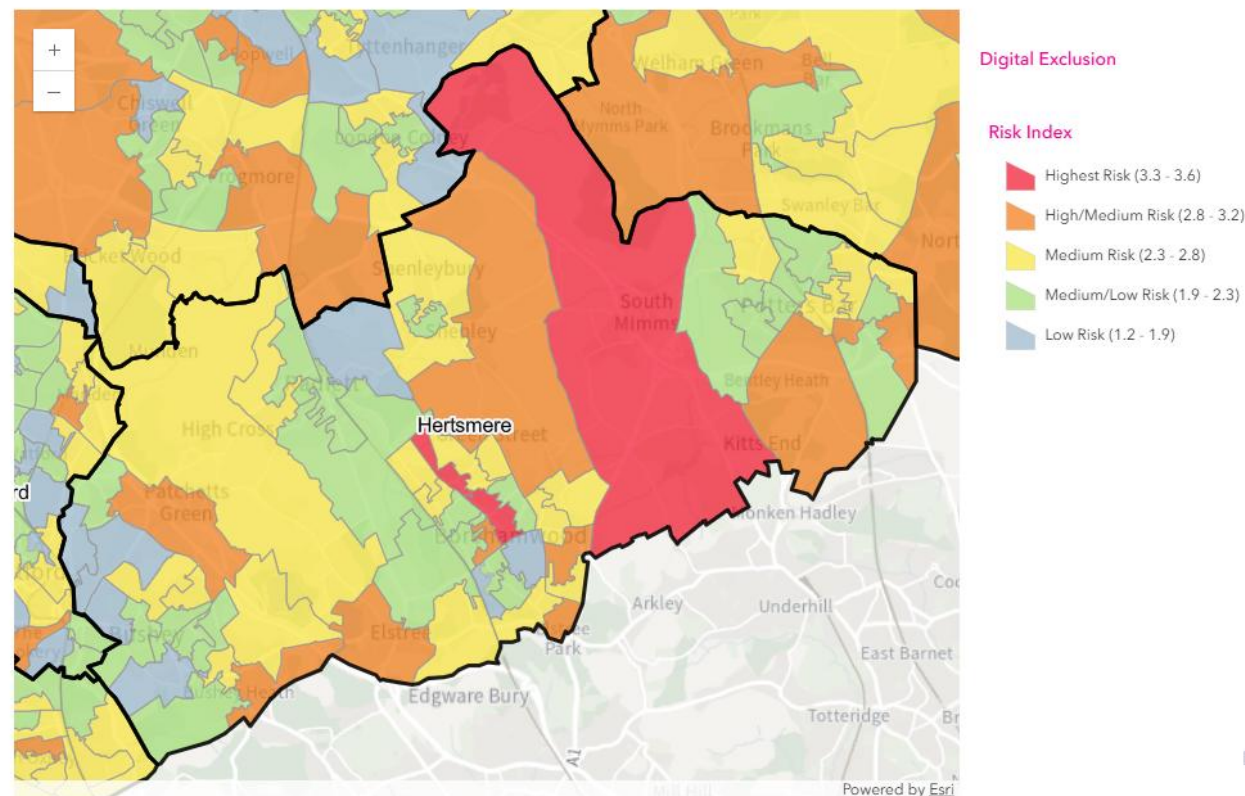

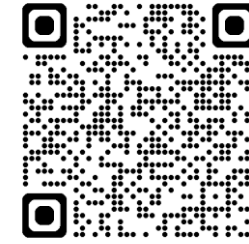

- Hertsmere's population increased by around 7,800 between the last two censuses (held in 2011 and 2021)
- Population growth was lower in Hertsmere than across the East of England. Percentage population change between 2011 and 2021:

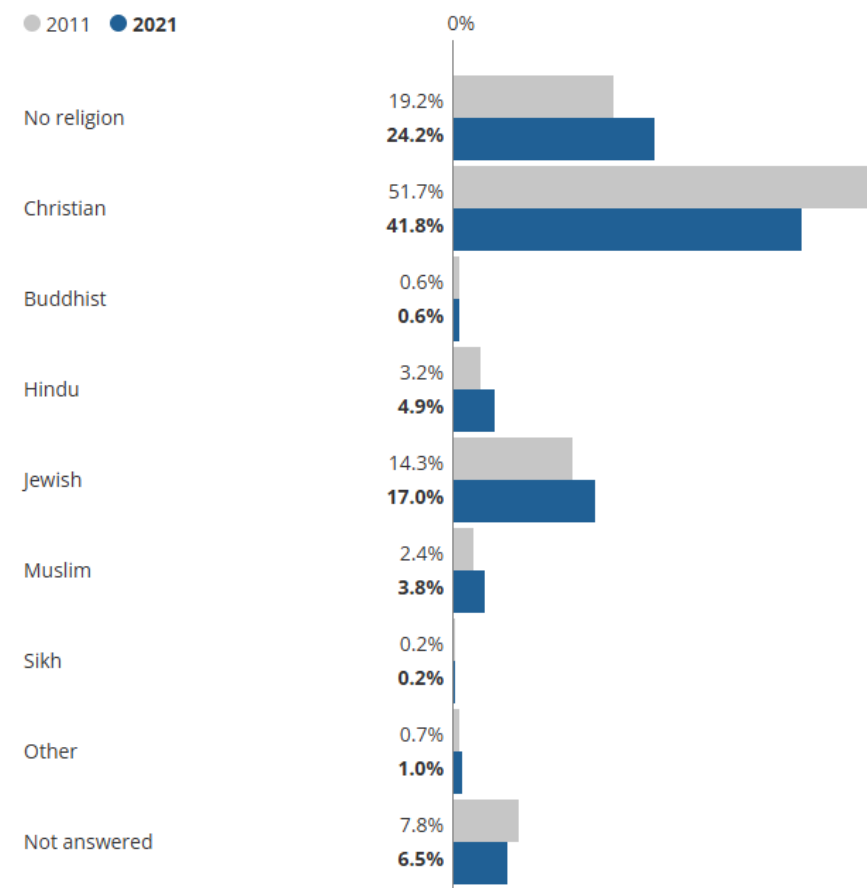

- In 2021, Hertsmere was home to around 7.6 people per football pitch-sized piece of land, compared with 7.1 in 2011. This area was among the top 45% most densely populated English local authority areas at the last census.
- Of Hertsmere households, 17.3% rented privately in 2021, up from 12.5% in 2011.
- In 2021, 4.8% of Hertsmere residents (aged five years and over) reported providing up to 19 hours of unpaid care each week. This figure decreased from 7.5% in 2011. These are age-standardised proportions that account for differences in the population size and age structure.

In 2021, 24.2% of usual residents in Hertsmere reported having "No religion"

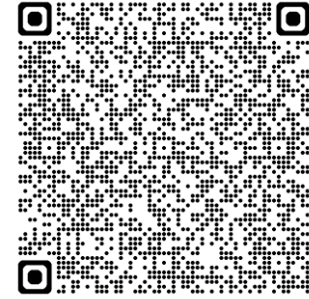
Percentage of usual residents by religion, **Hertsmere**

National Insurance Numbers (NINOs) Registrations To Adult Overseas Nationals Entering The UK

- The NINo statistics show the number of people registering for a NINo in order to work or to claim benefits / tax credits and are one of a number of supplementary measures produced by Government of in-migration to the UK.
- They are a measure of in-flow to the UK, primarily for employment, including both short-term and long-term migrants and include foreign nationals who have already been in the country but not previously required a NINo as well as migrants who may have subsequently returned abroad.
- NINo statistics are **not** a direct measure of long-term migration and therefore are not directly comparable with ONS long-term estimates of immigration.

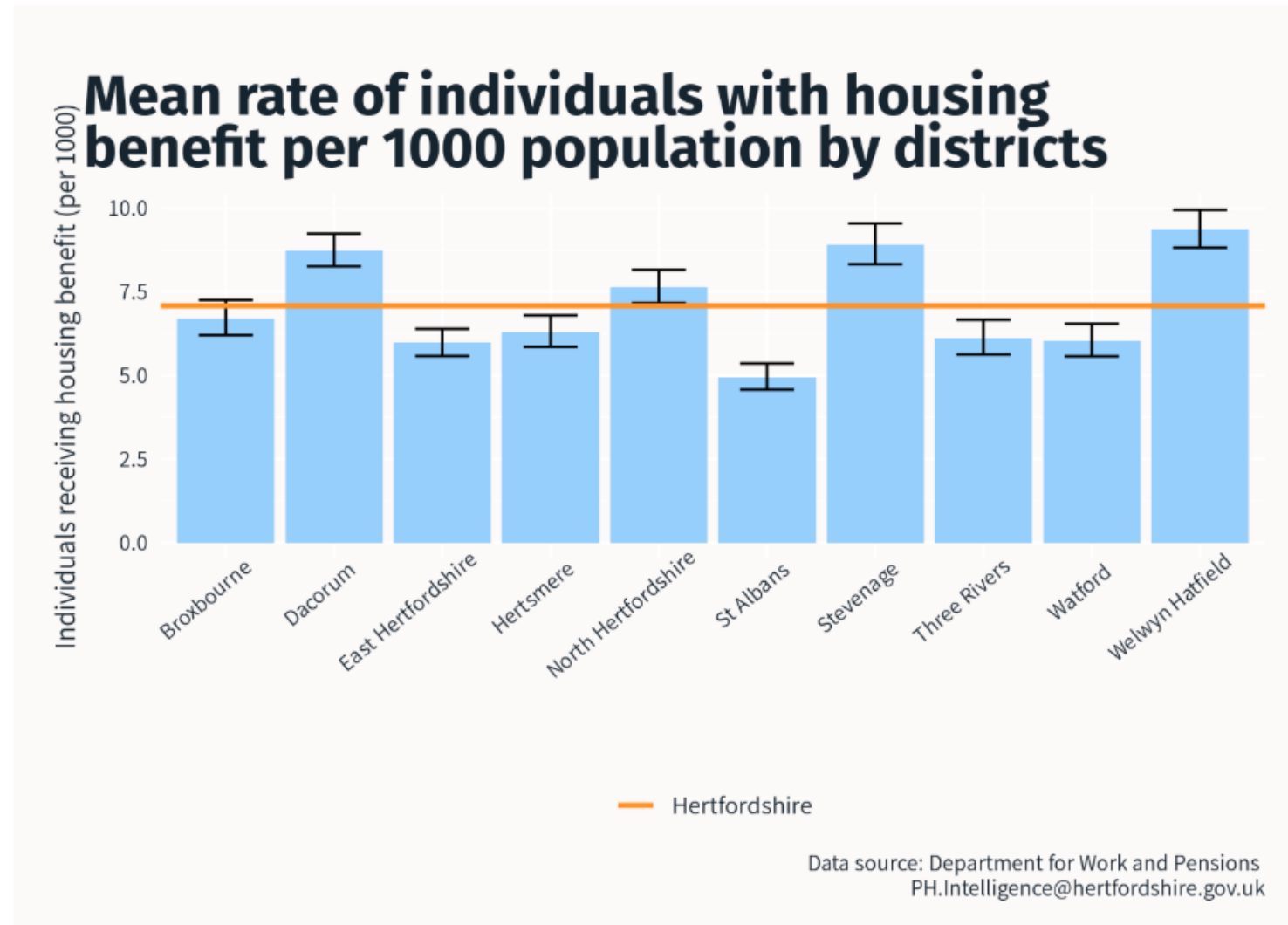

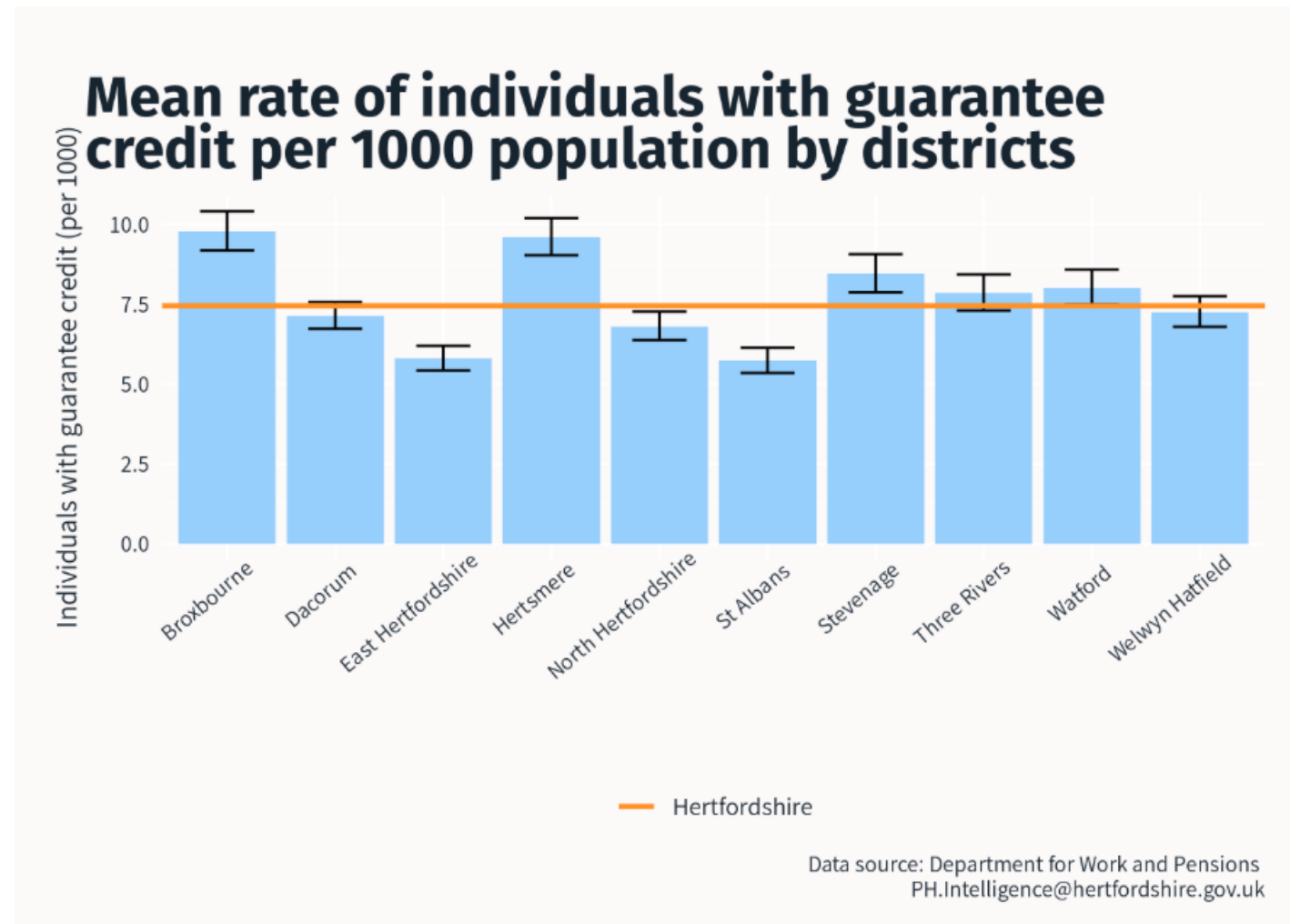
Overall in Hertfordshire, the rate of universal credit claimants per 10,000 population is 6.13. Of all Hertfordshire districts, the districts with the highest rate of universal credit claimants was in Stevenage (12.7 per 10,000) followed by Broxbourne (10.8 per 10,000), which were both significantly higher than the Hertfordshire rate.

- Housing Benefit



When plotted by district, Welwyn Hatfield had the highest rate of individuals with housing benefit at 9.4 per 1,000, followed by Stevenage (8.9 per 1,000) and Dacorum (8.7 per 1,000). These districts all had a significantly higher rate compared to the overall figure for Hertfordshire (7.1 per 1,000).

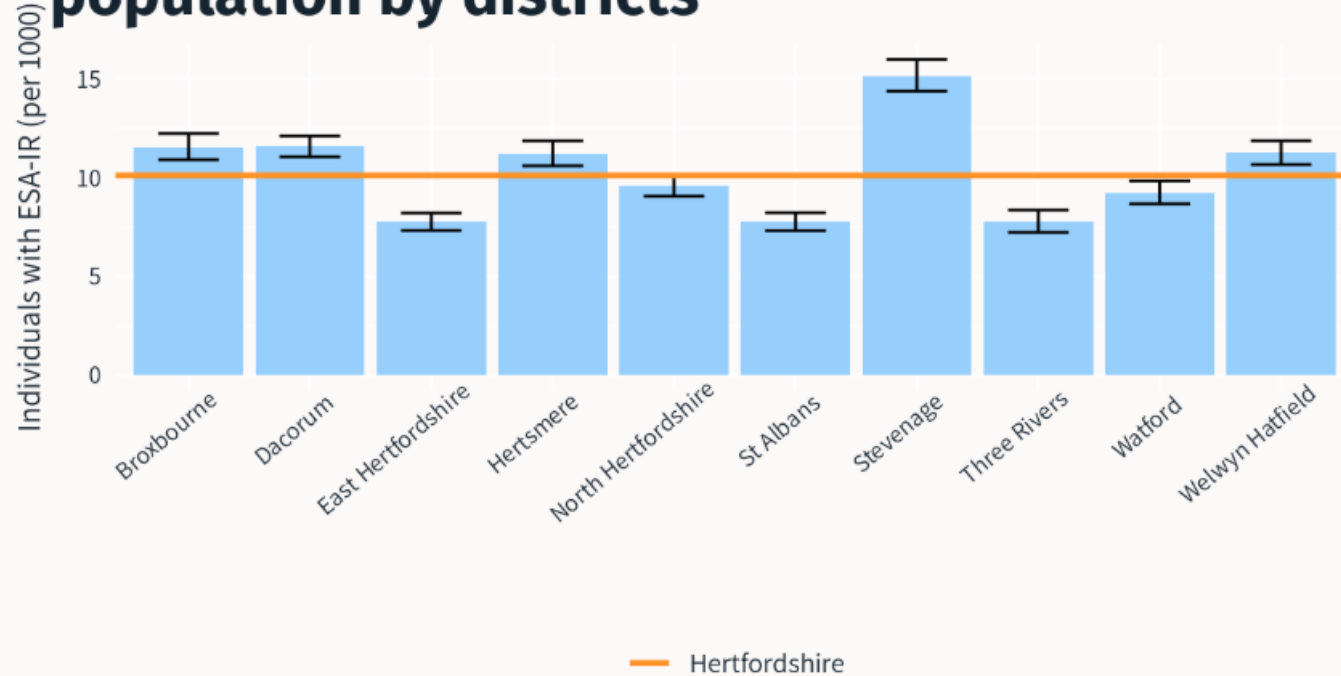
- Guarantee Credit



Overall in Hertfordshire, there were 7.4 people per 1,000 population benefiting from guarantee credit in 2023. The district with the highest rate was Broxbourne with 9.8 people with guarantee credit per 1,000, followed by Hertsmeire (9.6) and Stevenage (8.4). They all had significantly higher rates of people with guarantee credit compared to the overall Hertfordshire figure.

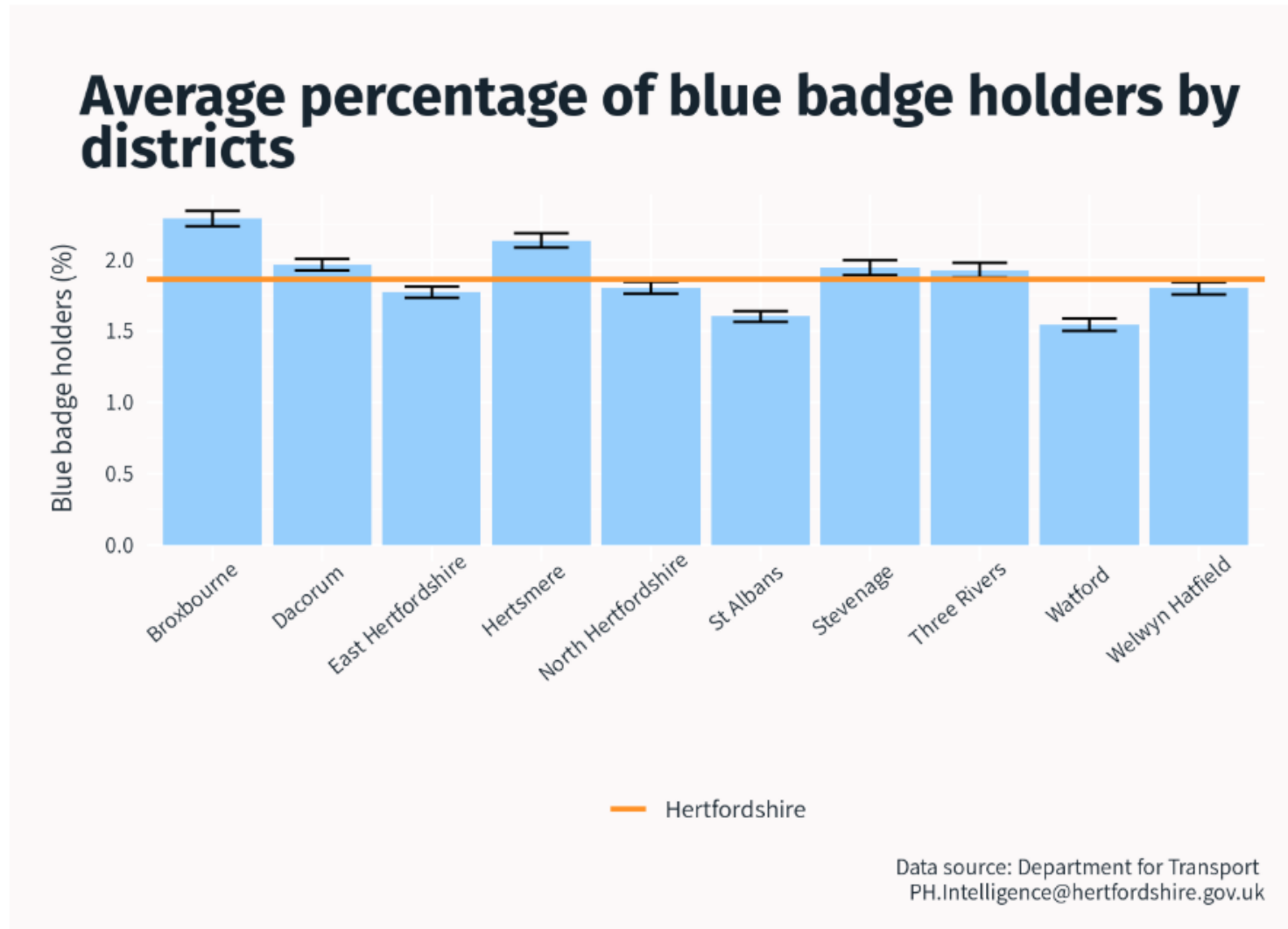
Mean rate of individuals with income-related employment and support allowance per 1000 population by districts

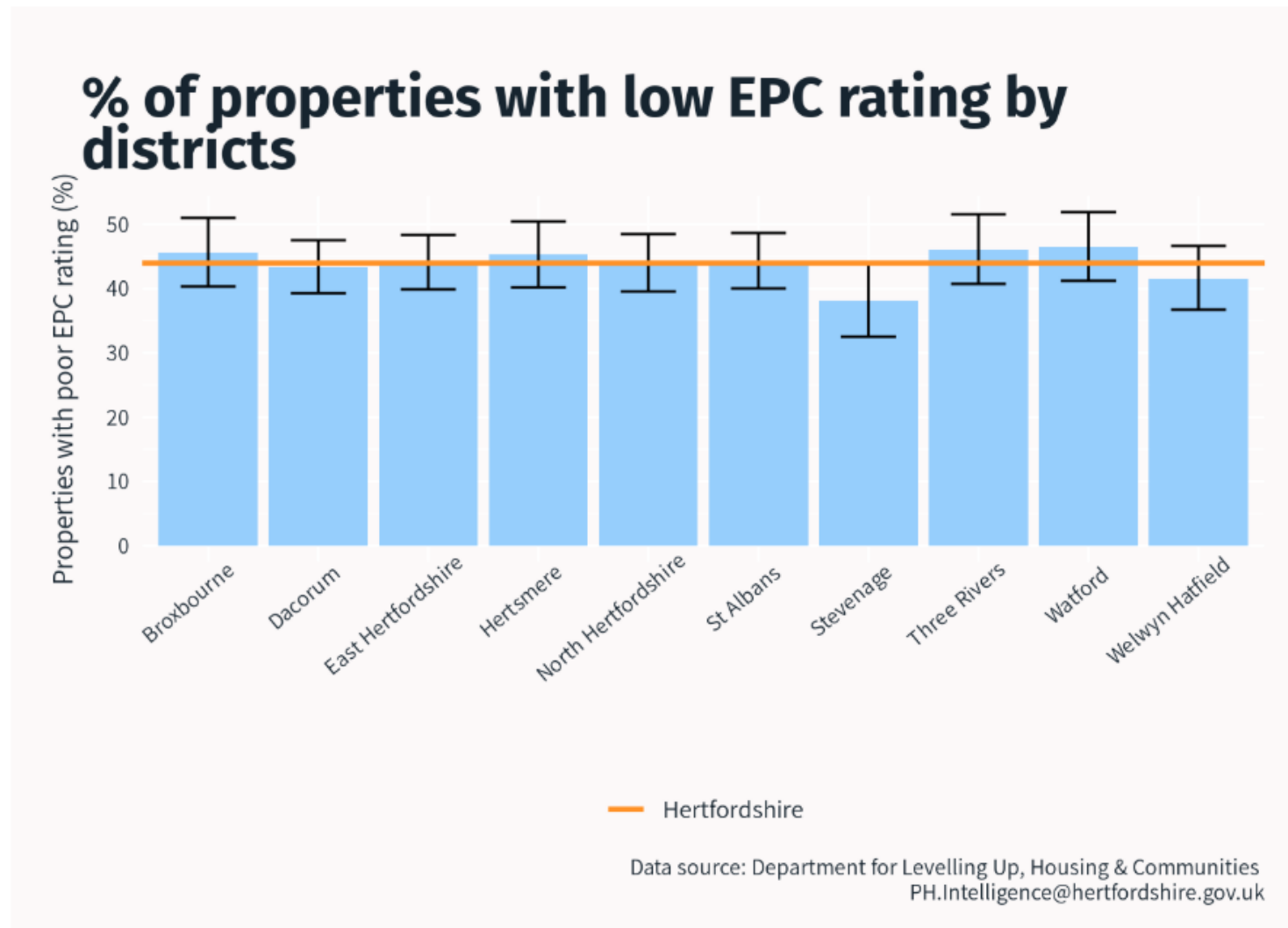
Overall in Hertfordshire, there were 10.1 people per 1,000 population with ESA-IR. The district with the highest rate was Stevenage with 15.1 people with ESA-IR per 1,000, followed by Dacorum (11.6) and Broxbourne (11.5). They all had significantly higher rates of people with ESA-IR compared to the overall Hertfordshire figure.

- Blue Badge



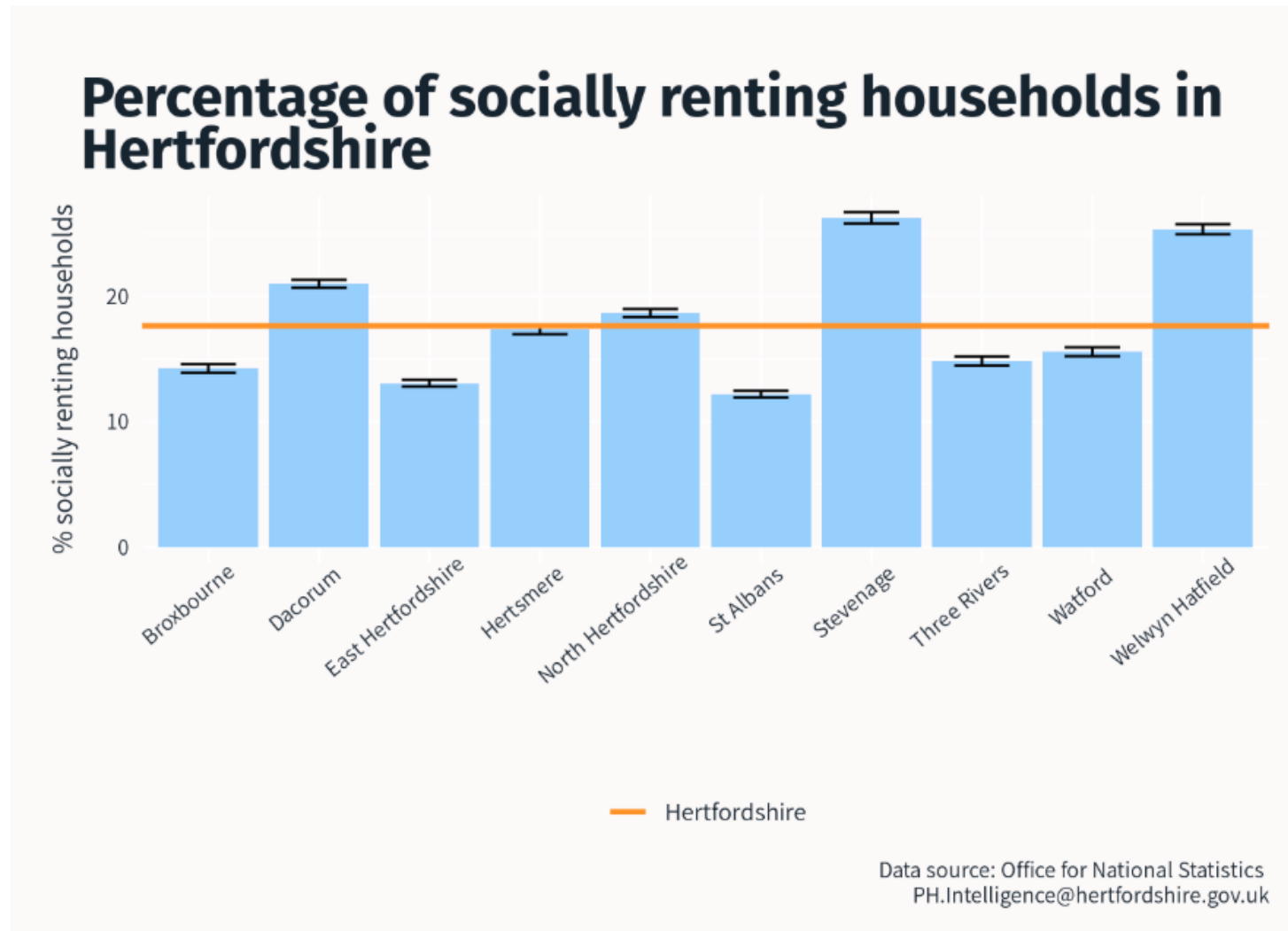
Overall in Hertfordshire, an average of 1.9% of the population were issued blue badges between 2021 and 2023. The highest density of blue badge holders was found in Broxbourne with 2.3% of its population with blue badges, followed by Hertsmere with 2.1%, and 1.9% in Dacorum.

- EPC



Overall in Hertfordshire, 44% of housing had low EPC ratings. Of all districts, Watford had the highest percentage of housing with low EPC rating at 46%, followed by Three Rivers 46.1% and Broxbourne at 45.6%. Stevenage had the lowest percentage of low EPC rating housing at 38%.

- Social Renting



Overall in Hertfordshire, 17.7% of households are socially renting. Of all districts in Hertfordshire, Stevenage had the highest proportion of socially renting households with 26.3%, followed by Welwyn Hatfield with 25.3%, and Dacorum with 21%.

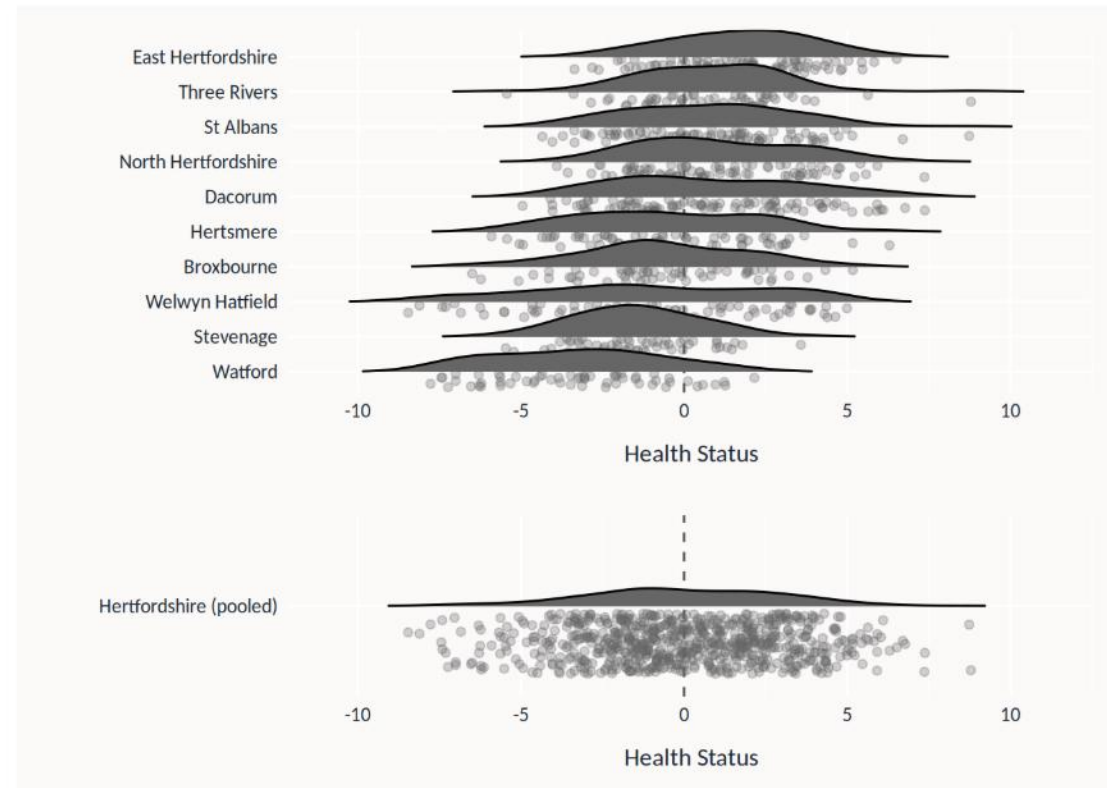

- Complex Analysis takes many different factors and groups them into the most important categories
 - **Health Status** describes most of the variation in health in Hertfordshire. A high value on the Health Status index means good healthy life expectancy, good management of health conditions, and lower deprivation. A low value here indicates poor health, high deprivation, and also indicates a need for culturally appropriate health interventions.
 - **Disease Burden** describes prevalence of long term health conditions and emergency admissions for long term conditions and lifestyle factors, which may be linked to financial circumstances and access to healthy food. A high value on the Disease Burden index indicates high prevalence of long term conditions alongside high rates of emergency admissions for conditions that contribute to the life expectancy gap.
 - **Access and Environment** describes access to services and assets that influence our health. A high value on this index indicates poor access to health-promoting services, and higher prevalence of a small number of long term health conditions including chronic kidney disease, dementia and frailty. It also indicates a requirement for culturally appropriate health interventions.
- Note, sometimes the factors can have contrary contributions – they are not exclusive and need to be interpreted as a composite (e.g. effects may cancel)

- **Health Status**

Hertsmere LSOAs tend to have more negative scores indicating higher IMD, employment deprivation, and decreased access to GP & Dental. Negative scores are also associated with fewer long-term conditions and more non-White ethnicities

East Hertfordshire (top) has the bulk of LSOAs with a positive score in Health Status, compared with Watford (lower) where the bulk of LSOAs have a negative score in Health Status. Welwyn Hatfield has LSOAs with a large range of values in Health Status, whereas Stevenage tends to have values clustered more tightly, with most LSOAs having a negative score.

People living in those LSOAs with a negative score in Health Status are more likely to be experiencing higher rates of deprivation and employment deprivation, and are less likely to have good access to GP and dental services, or good access to healthy food. They are less likely to be living with long term health conditions. People living in these LSOAs are also more likely to have non-White ethnicities



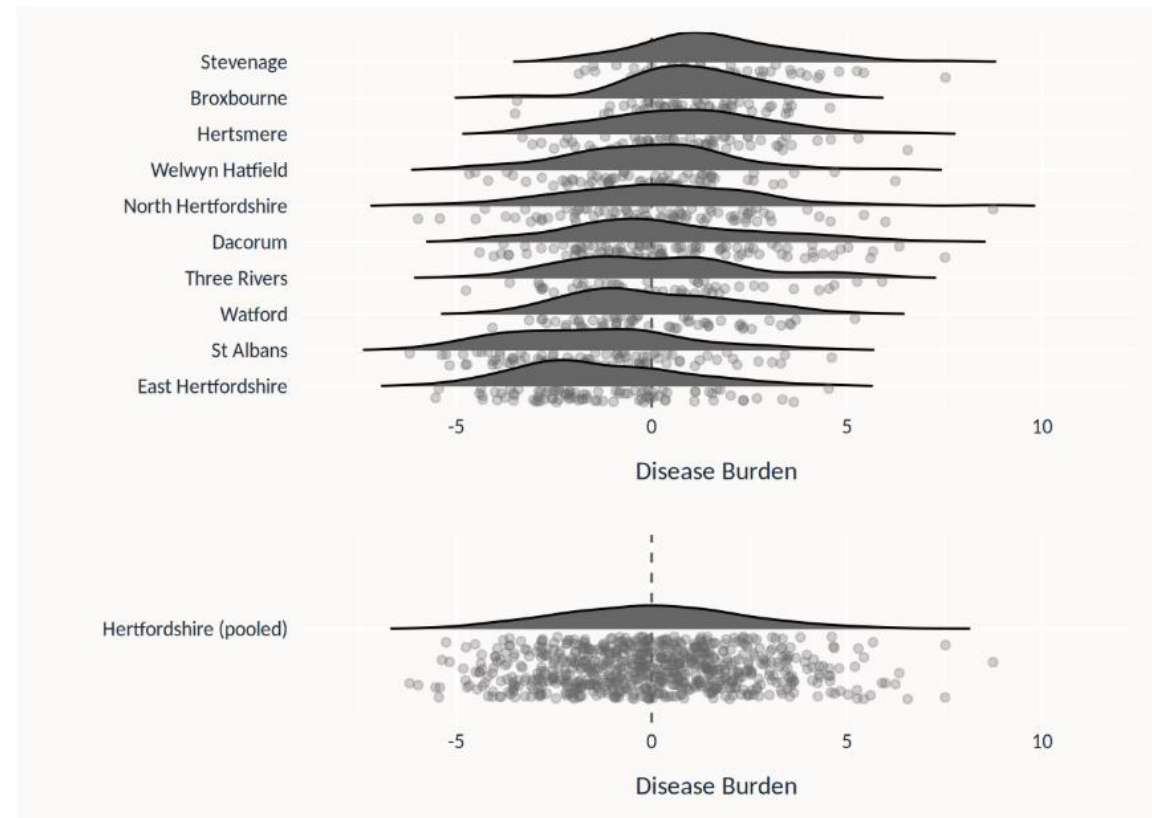
- **Disease Burden**

Hertsmere LSOAs tend to have positive disease burden scores.

Positive scores are associated with more long term conditions, emergency visits, and higher levels of IMD and employment deprivation, and insecure access to healthy foods

Stevenage (top) has the bulk of LSOAs having a positive score in Disease Burden, compared with St Albans and East Hertfordshire (bottom) where most LSOAs have a negative score.

People living in LSOAs with a high positive score on Disease Burden are more likely to be living with long-term conditions and be experiencing emergency department attendances indicating a potential need for improvements in condition management. They are also more likely to be experiencing higher levels of deprivation and employment deprivation, with insecure access to healthy foods.



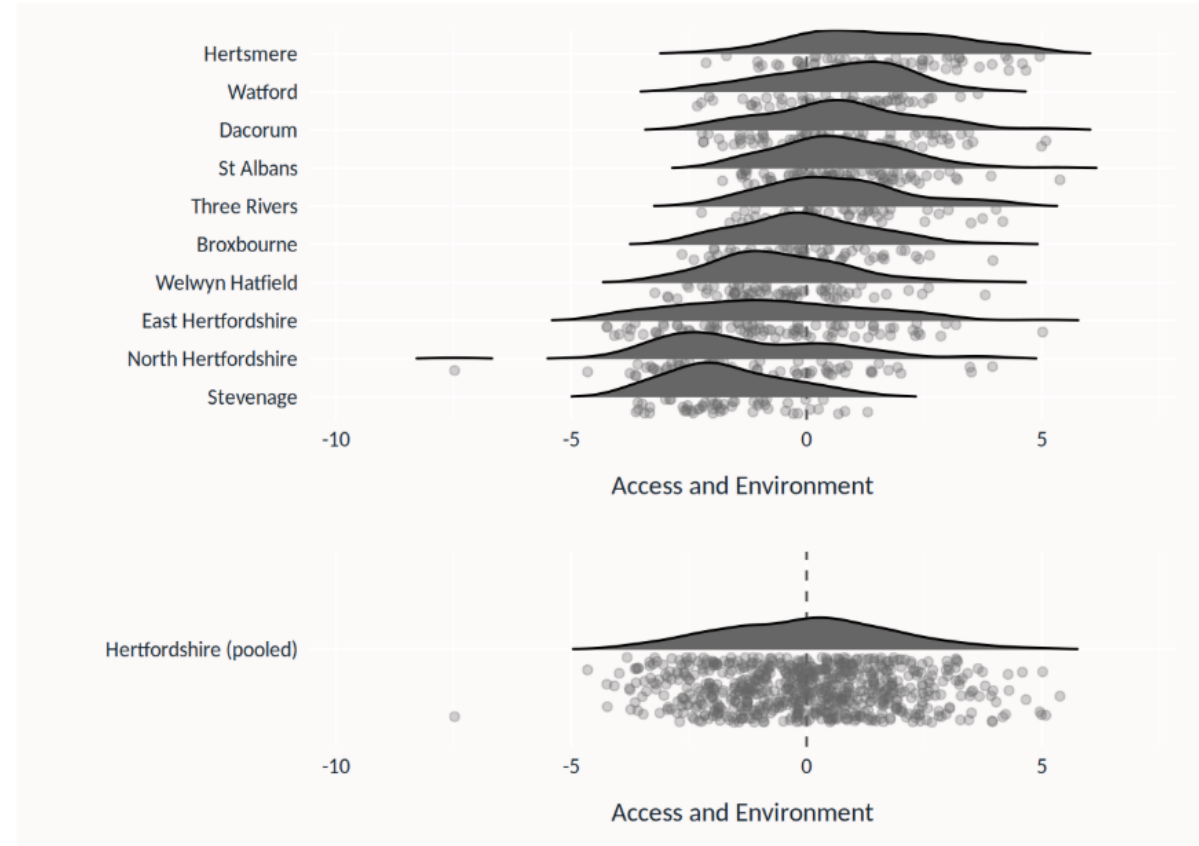
- **Access and Environment**

Hertsmere LSOAs have mostly positive scores for Access & Environment

Positive scores are associated with poor access to health promoting services and higher prevalence of CKD, dementia, and frailty. Other, Asian, and Mixed ethnicities are more frequent.

Hertsmere and Watford (top) have the bulk of their LSOAs having positive scores for Access and Environment, compared to Stevenage (bottom) where the bulk of LSOAs have a negative score for Access and Environment. Broxbourne LSOAs are split almost equally between positive and negative scores for this health index.

People living in LSOAs with positive scores in Access and Environment are likely to have poor access to health promoting services, and higher prevalence of chronic kidney disease, dementia and frailty. They are also more likely to be of Other, Asian, or Mixed ethnicity.

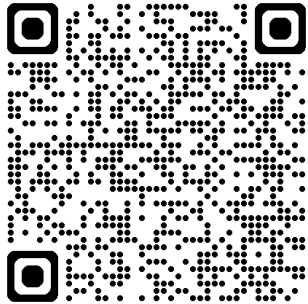

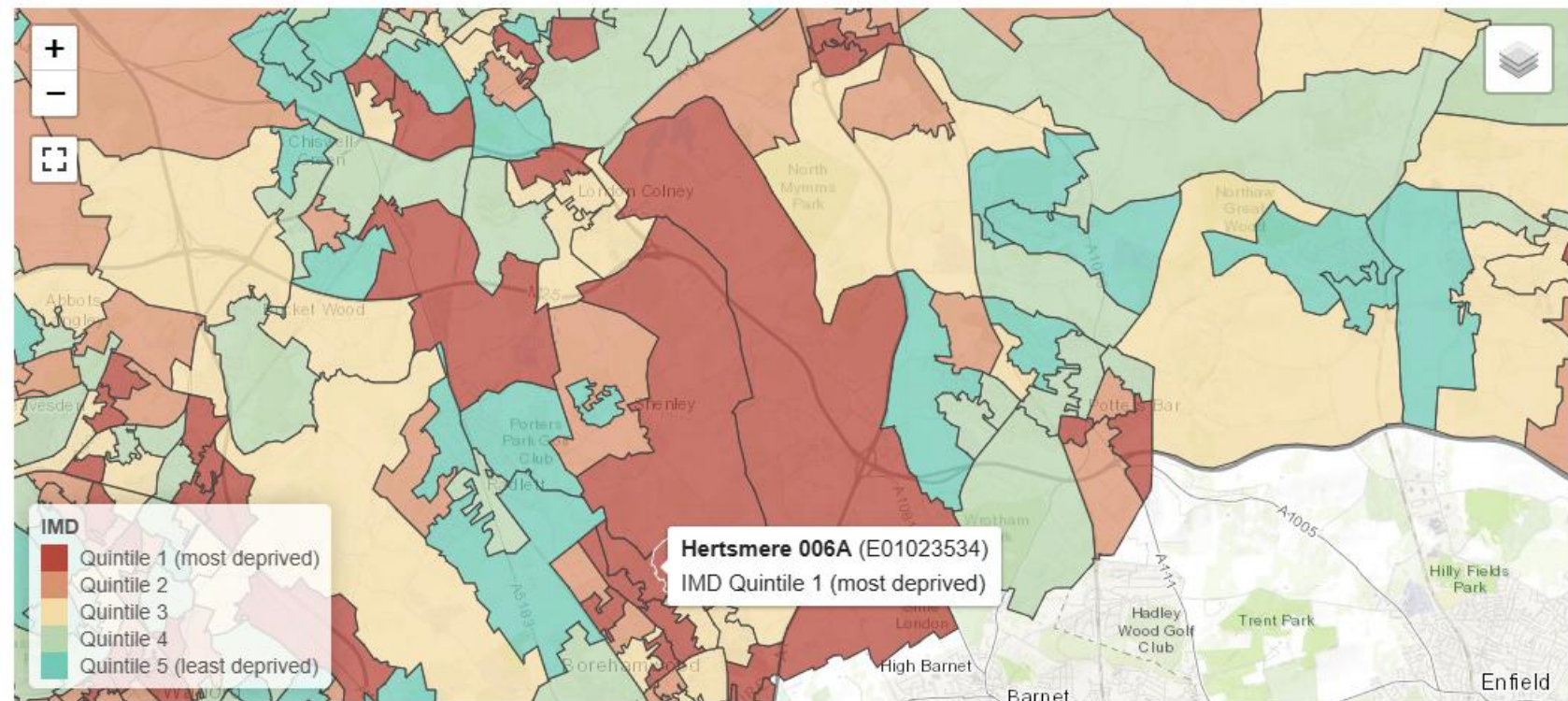

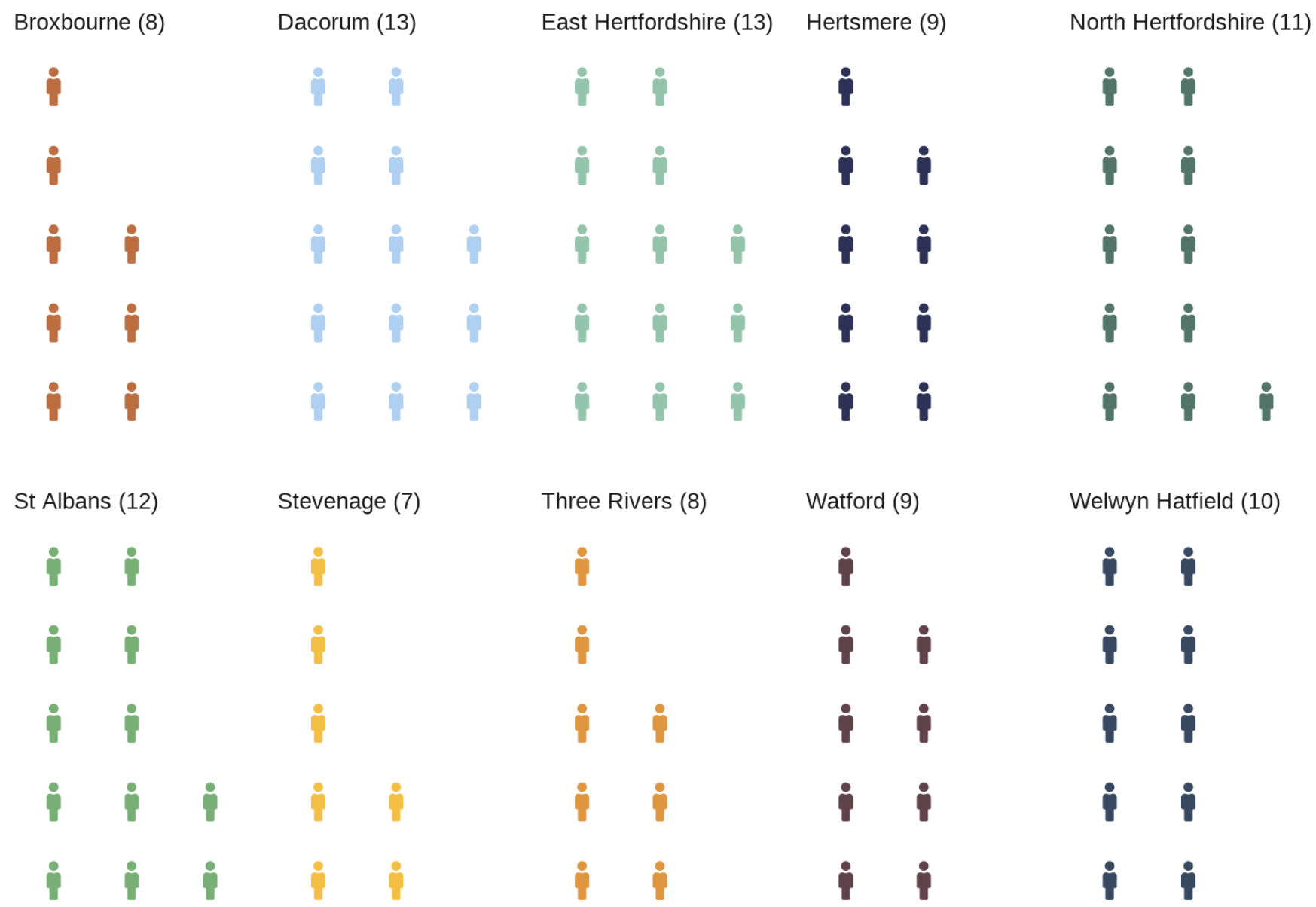

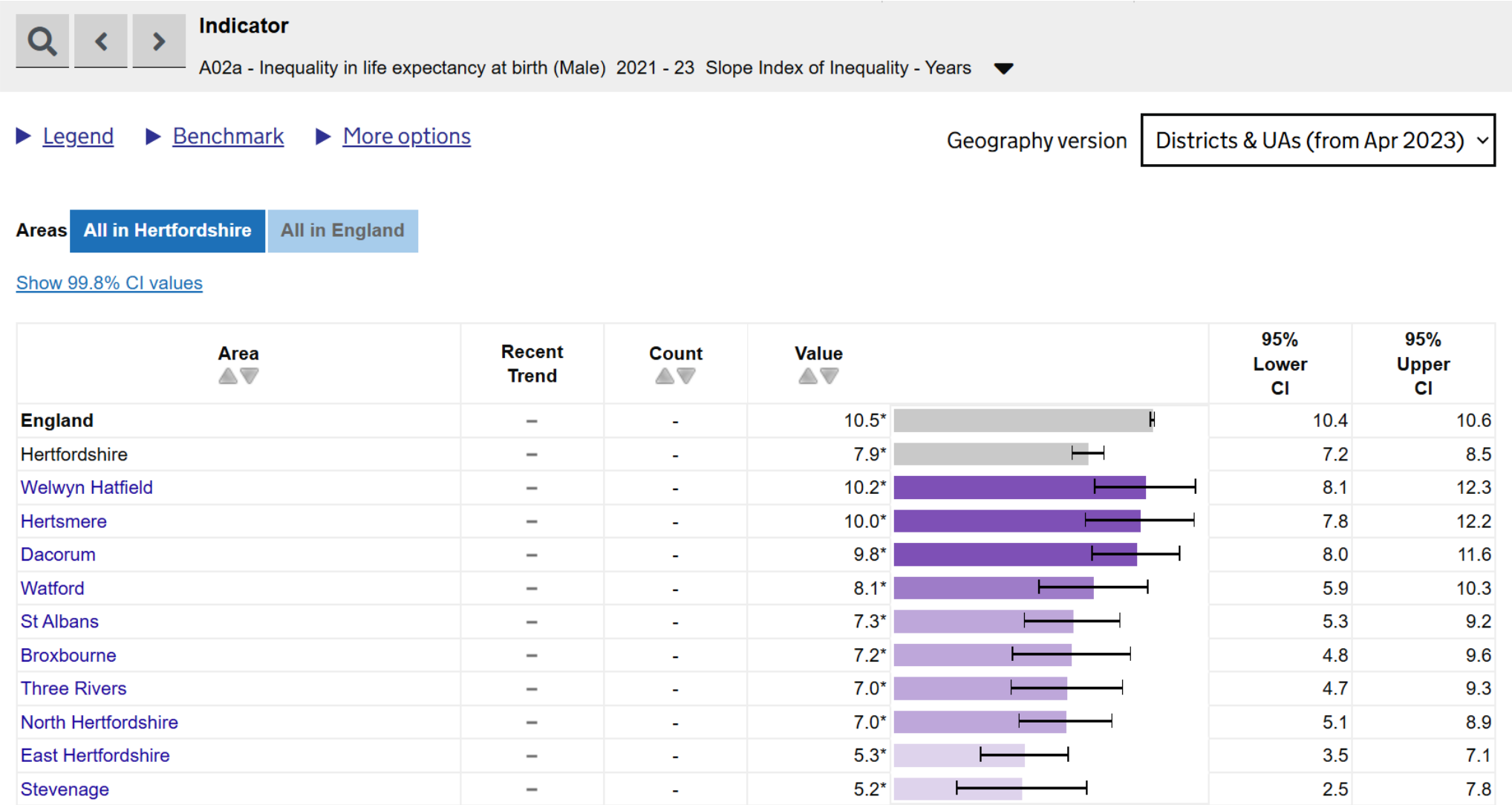
